HISTORY OF THE CJ SAVILLE CUP

Christopher James Saville arrived in Portland from England in about 1910 and worked for his much older cousin, John Saville Snr, who was the manager of the Standard Portland Cement Co. (and grandfather of Sue Thorne, nee Saville).

After working in Portland for some years and marrying a local girl, Lee, Chris moved to Charbon, to open and manage the cement works there for the Company. Here he became friendly with Jack Blackmore, the founder and President of the Show Society.

The CJ Saville Cup was given to the Show Society either by Chris himself or his family after his death, as a memorial trophy. Chris died in 1948 aged 61 and is buried in Rylstone Cemetery. It is thought that he died while still manager at the Cement Works.

RICH FRUIT CAKE

Ingredients:

250g (8oz) Sultanas ½ teaspoon Grated Nutmeg 250g (8oz) Chopped Raisins ½ teaspoon Ground Ginger 250g (8oz) Currants ½ teaspoon Ground Cloves

125g (4oz) Chopped Mixed Peel 250g (8 oz) Butter

90g (3oz) Chopped Red Glacé Cherries 250g (8oz) Soft Brown Sugar

90g (3oz) Chopped Blanched Almonds ½ teaspoon Lemon Essence or finely

grated lemon rind.

½ Cup Sherry or Brandy½ teaspoon Almond Essence250g (8oz) Plain Flour½ teaspoon Vanilla Essence

60g (2oz) Self Raising Flour. 4 Large Eggs

Method:

- Mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy.
 Cover and leave for at least 4 hours, preferably overnight
- Sift together the flours and spices.
- Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences.
- Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, and then alternately add fruit and flour mixtures.
- Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.
- Place the mixture into a prepared tin no larger than 20cm (8") and bake in slow oven approximately 3-4 hours.
- Allow to cool in tin

Note: To ensure uniformity and depending upon the size it is suggested the raisins be snipped into 2-3 pieces, cherries into 4-6 pieces and almonds cross-wise into 3-4 pieces.

- h) An exhibit in this competition may consist of the work of one individual or a group of individuals, or an organization.
- All three article/garments must have been completed within the 12 months prior to the local show and made by the exhibitor/s.
- j) An exhibit having won at a local show may be exhibited (the same three article/garments) at the Group Final. The winning exhibit at the Group Final is then eligible to compete in the State Final.
- k) An exhibit is only eligible to represent one Society at Group level and one Group at State level.
- I) An exhibit (article/garment) that has previously competed at Group level is not eligible to compete again.
